Message from the Chair

Michael Funston, LLM, Chair

I would like to start by acknowledging the work and dedication of Ms. Amber O'Connell, my predecessor as Chair of the HADIA Foundation. Amber's resignation took effect on 7 March 2023 when I assumed the role. I would also like to note how pleased we are that Dr Bilquis Ghani has joined the Foundation's Board. Bilquis brings both a wealth of relevant experience and great energy and enthusiasm to our work.

As we are all aware, the situation for a great many people in Afghanistan continues to be dire. Not only have Afghans had to endure the ongoing social and political turmoil associated with the Taliban takeover of the country in August 2021. Many have also been the victims of catastrophic natural disasters, including earthquakes, avalanches, and floods. The country has also recently endured its worst drought in decades. Compounding these problems, Afghanistan almost entirely lacks the capacity to provide the emergency and ongoing support services we take for granted.

In response to the impact of such natural disasters, and consistent with our mission to improve the lives of people in Afghanistan, in recent times HADIA's activities have focused heavily on the provision of emergency aid. As this report seeks to demonstrate, that focus has continued during financial year 2023.



That said, we were able to maintain other important programs as well over the reporting period. These include our mobile library service, which distributed books to many thousands of children across Eastern Afghanistan; and our multivitamins distribution program under which we provided multivitamins to 8,680 children and nursing mothers. In total, we helped 46,339 people.

I wish to thank our dedicated and courageous staff and volunteers in Afghanistan, together with our volunteers and my fellow directors here in Australia—in particular Executive Director Mr. Mahir Momand—for all their work on behalf of the Foundation over the last twelve months.

I also wish to warmly acknowledge our donors for their continued trust and support. It is only with your financial generosity that we can continue to help vulnerable people in Afghanistan. So, please continue to maintain that support in the year ahead.

Update

Mahir Momand, GAICD Founder & Exec Director

During fiscal year 2024, HADIA Foundation continued provision of humanitarian services in the areas of **education**, **health**, **emergency relief** and **empowerment**.

Under our **emergency food aid** program, we distributed basic food items such as flour, rice, beans, lentils, cooking oil, sugar, baby milk powder, and meat packages to **15,130 people**. Those assisted included victims of the devastating earthquakes in Herat province who also received medical aid, and Afghan refugees deported by Pakistan.

During fiscal year 2024, HADIA Foundation received another shipment of **multivitamins** to supplement the dietary needs of malnourished women and children whose numbers are unfortunately on the rise. As a result, a total of **6,940 children, and women** (who are often breastfeeding), were provided nourishing multivitamins across a few provinces of Afghanistan.

HADIA Foundation's flagship education project, our mobile library, that provides books to girls and boys in remote areas of Afghanistan continued to operate and **distributed books** to **55,066 children** more than half of whom were girls. Our mobile library is now able to travel far and wide across eastern Afghanistan, including many rural areas that were earlier not accessible due to the insurgency operations.

We are thrilled that during this year, we were able to enter into a **partnership with UNSW**, a major Australian university. Under this partnership, UNSW provided the first of its tertiary education scholarships



to an Afghan girl from Afghanistan. Her first semester's exam results indicate that she has secured a **distinction** which is testament of the talent of many Afghan girls who are banned from obtaining tertiary education in the Taliban controlled Afghanistan.

During the year we also entered into a partnership with UK based Charity Right. One of the agreements signed with Charity Right helped HADIA Foundation provide meat during the Eid ul Adha to underprivileged people in capital city Kabul.

The second agreement with Charity Right is to start a new project providing school meals to a girls primary school in the Kot district of Nangrahar province. This project will run until the end of December 2024 providing nearly 100,000 school meals, 6 days a week, to a total 731 persons (670 students and 61 teachers and staff of school). HADIA Foundation hopes to support girls education with this project and increase the number of girls from the nearby villages to attend the primary school.

Lastly, a massive thanks to our team and volunteers both in Afghanistan and Australia for their passion and dedication.

The Humanitarian Assistance for Driving International Action (HADIA) Foundation is a non-governmental, non-political charity founded in Australia by a group of Afghan and Australian professionals. HADIA Foundation runs humanitarian programs in Afghanistan.

The Foundation is registered with the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission (ACNC) as a charity with Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) status.

Our work

Our programs are designed to meaningfully improve the quality of life of people in need and inspire hope for a brighter tomorrow. **HADIA Foundation provides humanitarian assistance in the areas of:**



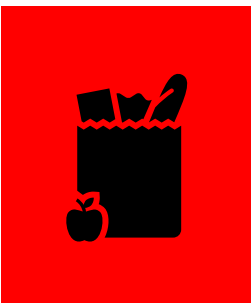
Education

Under the Education program, HADIA Foundation has setup Afghanistan's first **mobile library** for children that provides books to girls and boys across rural and remote Afghanistan. We also run a **sporting equipment** such as soccer balls for children. **Our new school meals project provides meals for girls of primary school in Afghanistan.**



Health

As part of our Health program, we provide **multivitamins** to women and children across Afghanistan, particularly in rural and remote areas where malnutrition is a major issue. Provision of **clean drinking water** by digging water wells and undertaking **cataract surgeries** to return eyesight are also covered under this program.



Emergency Relief

This program covers providing **food packages** to the most vulnerable, particularly after the fall of Afghanistan to the hands of Taliban, earthquakes and flash floods. Under the emergency relief program, we also provide **winter clothing** in Kabul prior to the arrival of winter season. This includes second-hand clothes and shoes



Empowerment

HADIA Foundation's core objective is to empower its beneficiaries to become self-reliable. In addition to the health, education and emergency relief programs that are all designed to bring about self-sustainability, we provide **non-interest loans** and also make **prosthetic hands** available to people who have lost hands due to war.

How we work

Our operating model

Sustainable Development Goals

Our humanitarian work is based on the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). SDGs are a collection of 17 goals that focus on systematic transformation of our world for the better. At HADIA Foundation, we focus on Goal 1 – **No Poverty**, Goal 2 – **Zero Hunger**, Goal 3 – **Good Health and Wellbeing**, Goal 4 – **Quality Education**, Goal 6 – **Clean Water** and Goal 8 – **Decent Work** and Economic Growth.



Use of Volunteers

The Foundation recognises that Afghanistan, especially in rural areas, is struggling with extremely low literacy rates, poor health, lack of infrastructure and economic weakness. It is therefore susceptible to the ongoing vulnerabilities of war. The Australian operation provides fundraising, strategy and direction to volunteers and workers on the ground in Afghanistan. In Australia we communicate with donors, raise funds, hold meetings and manage compliance aspects. Charitable works are not undertaken in Australia, and all activities performed in Australia are undertaken on a volunteer basis. Directors and Australian staff do not get paid. All funds raised go towards covering costs in overseas operations.

Big Outcomes with Little Costs

For many of the HADIA Foundation's projects, we simply collect the donated "goods" from our partner organisations in western countries and then ship them to Afghanistan for distribution to the most vulnerable people. For example, our USA based partner Vitamin Angels provides us with multivitamins which we distribute in rural Afghanistan to women and children. Similarly, our overseas based partners who provide us prosthetic hands make the prosthetic hands available to the HADIA Foundation and we fit them to those who need them in Afghanistan. This way, our costs to make an impact are very low and only relate to the implementation costs. For our other projects, we buy locally in Afghanistan, we only operate from a small shop which is converted into an office and we have minimum operating costs. This is evident in the fact that during FY 24 we only spent \$92,126 to serve 76,690 individuals with our projects.

Safety and Security of Our People and Beneficiaries

The Foundation takes very seriously its obligation to ensure that work undertaken demonstrates care and responsibility for the wellbeing of its staff, volunteers and the vulnerable people it serves. To this end we have implemented policies across the Australian and Afghan operations which cover: • Risk management • Child protection • Equal opportunity and anti-discrimination • Anti Sexual harassment • Safety and incident reporting • Complaints management • Transparency and accountability • Organisational governance, and more copies of the above policies are available on request by contacting info@hadiafoundation.org.

Introducing The Team

As a refugee child, our founder Mahir Momand was beneficiary of one the makeshift schools that was built to educate Afghan

children. The schools did not have any buildings or classrooms with children sitting on the ground under open skies to get an education with the hope for a brighter future. The books provided to children were just black and white that often taught literacy and literacy with pictures and examples of guns and bullets. When Mahir grew, obtained tertiary education and started working he founded HADIA Foundation to give colourful books to children that teach peace, coexistence and self-reliance. It was with this idea that the HADIA Foundation was established in 2016. Mahir is of the view that educated and healthy people can help bring and stability to Afghanistan.



Mahir is an internationally renowned development sector expert with vast international experience in Canada, Australia and Afghanistan. He has previously worked for the United Nations, the World Bank and served as a senior Financial Advisor to the Minister of Labor and Social Affairs of the Government of Afghanistan. Mahir grew up in a large and hardworking family. He arrived in Australia as a refugee, with a strong passion for improving the daily lives of those still suffering in his war-torn home country. Through his established network of professionals in Afghanistan, Mahir has been able to grow the Foundation with a significant amount of volunteer and community support. **Louise Petschler**

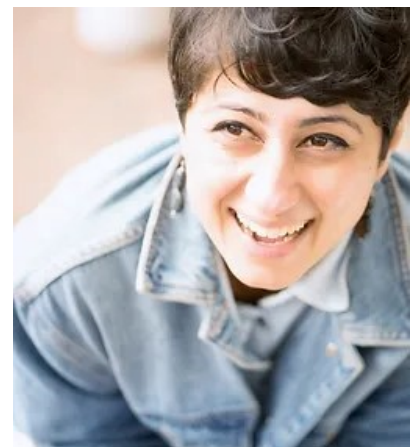
Non-Executive Director

Bilquis's social justice background spans beyond formal institutions and forms an integral part of her life. She is co-founder and lead for *Hunar Symposia*, a collective of academics and artists creating spaces of discourse and collaboration between practice and theory. Bilquis's PhD employed a hermeneutic phenomenological approach to understand how cultural products can be deployed to reconceptualize gender and identity in conflict zones, namely, Kabul, Afghanistan.



Projects FY 24

Education

Mobile Library

The Foundation's mobile library was set up in 2016, it promotes the culture of book reading amongst Afghan children and youth.

Initially setup on tricycle motorbikes (now a minivan), the library travels the streets of Afghanistan's villages and suburbs playing its 'ice-cream van' like tune which was composed for the library by some of Afghanistan's best singers and composers. Kids hear the tune of mobile library inside their homes, come out and get their free books. The library returns approximately two weeks later to collect old books and swap with new ones.

Books are also loaned to informal schools which often otherwise lack resources. So far, we have provided books to more than **257,614 children, 52% of whom are girls** - mainly in the rural areas of Afghanistan. This includes distribution of books to 55,066 children during the financial year 2024.

Given the Taliban's ban on education for girls, our library gives hope to Afghan girls by constantly supplying them books to continue reading. HADIA Foundation has partnered with Charity Right to provide 100,000 meals from July to December 2024 in a primary girls school in rural Afghanistan. More details to follow in FY 25.

Health

Multivitamins

While in the past, HADIA Foundation has implemented a range of projects as part of its Health program including eyesight recovery surgeries and provision of clean drinking water, During the FY 24, the focus of our Health program was on providing Multivitamins to women and children across Afghanistan.

Thanks to our USA based partner Vitamin Angels, during the year we received a shipment of multivitamins containing a range of most needed multivitamin. The shipment contained multivitamins for nearly 2,000 pregnant women ,and 5,200 children that included chewable Albendazole tablets, Vitamin A for children of 6-11 months and 12-59 months.

Using its network of volunteer doctors, and clinics, HADIA Foundation started distributing the said Multivitamins and tablets across a diverse range of provinces of Afghanistan.

These multivitamins help children and pregnant women who lack nutritious food in the current dire economic situation in Afghanistan. During the year, a total of **6,940 women and children** received multivitamins which partly included the multivitamin from the previous shipment. The distribution process will continue to FY 25.

Emergency Relief

Emergency Food Aid

With millions of people grappling with acute hunger in Afghanistan after the Taliban takeover, Under this project we distributed basic food items such as flour, rice, beans, lentils, cooking oil, sugar and baby milk powder to **15,130 people**.

Some of the beneficiaries included women-led families who don't have a male support. This was also due to the fact that Taliban have stopped many women from working, some of whom were the prime breadwinners for their families.

The project has had tremendous **impact** on the lives of beneficiaries as it has not only provided emergency relief against hunger to the most vulnerable families consisting young children, widowed women and the elderly, but has also prevented many families from becoming beggars.



Eid-ul-Adha - Meat Distribution

During the year, HADIA Foundation also received donations from **Charity Right** and a handful of Australia based donors who wanted their Eid donations to go to support people in Afghanistan who are doing it tough. As a result, in June 2024 during the Eid-ul-Adha period, the HADIA Foundation distributed meat packages to 2,438 families mostly in the central Kabul and eastern Nangrahar provinces.

Empowerment

Prosthetic Hands

Since 2016 the Foundation has been fitting free prosthetic hands to land-mine victims across Afghanistan. Sadly, there are many individuals with disabilities across Afghanistan due to landmine explosions and war.

With the support of the US-based Ellen Meadow Foundation and Australia's Helping Hands, the Foundation has secured hundreds of prosthetic hands. Our volunteer doctors fit the prosthetics and train recipients in their use.

This helps beneficiaries become self-reliant and rejoin the workforce, be it as workers or working in their own farms. During FY 24 only 4 prosthetic hands due to the foundation's focus on provision of emergency food aid program. The two hands that were fitted brings the total to 522 beneficiaries.

Non-interest Microloans

The Foundation has made available non-interest loans to 5 small business owners in order to empower them in becoming economically self-reliant and not needing to rely on charity. 50% of loans are written off to provide capital base for borrowers especially after the change of regime in Afghanistan that has impacted small business.

Aspiring business owners often don't have access to traditional financial products from banking institutions.

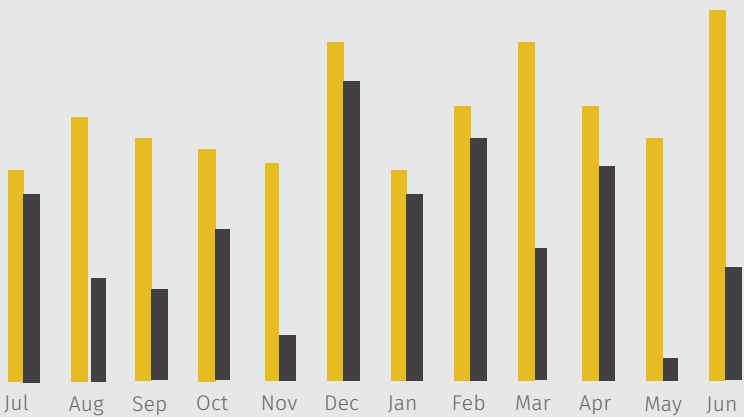

(FY 24)

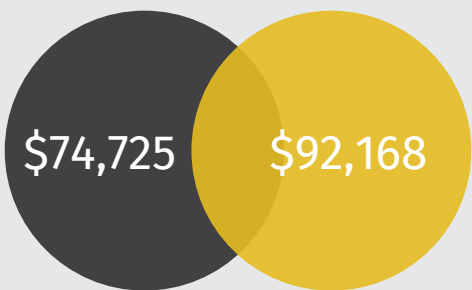
During financial year 2024 the average amount of monthly expenses sat at almost \$7,700. The previous years surplus was also spent together with the new funds raised during FY 24.

Income Expenses



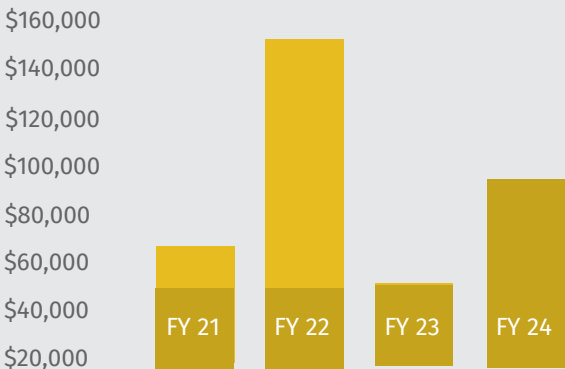
Income and Expenses

Total Income

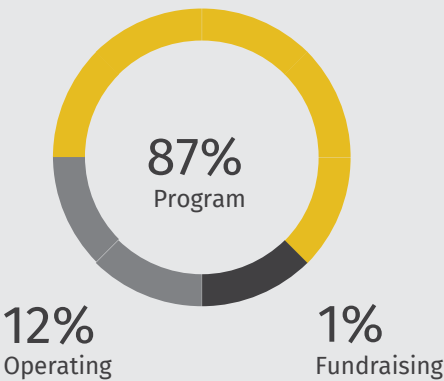
(In Thousands)



Efficiency Statistics

The absolute majority of funds raised go towards program costs. During financial year 24 the amount of total expenses spent on program costs was 87%. Operating costs were at 12% and fundraising costs sat nearly at 1%. During the year 45 donors (last year 45) individual donors provide \$74,624 (last year \$41,273) which is an average of \$1,658 per donor.

Expenses



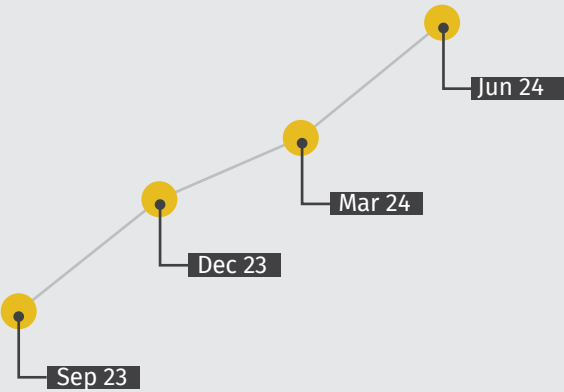
Donation Sources

Like the previous financial year the amount of financial donations remained steady for HADIA Foundation. The addition of Charity Right as a new donor has increased the value of donations due to the School Meals project and the Eid-ul-Adha meat project.





Case Studies

Nasima

Nasima, a widow in eastern Afghanistan, faced immense challenges raising her four children alone. With no male family member to support her, she works tirelessly as a cleaner in people's homes. However, her meager earnings barely covers rent, let alone enough food for her family. Each day is a struggle, filled with anxiety about how to provide for her children who are all girls.



HADIA Foundation supported Nasima with emergency food packages for months. These packages were a lifeline for Nasima and countless others in similar situations. When she received her first package, her heart filled with hope. Inside were staples like rice, lentils, cooking oil, and flour—essentials that could sustain her family for weeks.

With the food supply secured, Nasima said it “felt like a weight lifted off my shoulders and I don’t have to marry my elder daughter off early”. She said she can now focus on her cleaning work without the constant worry of where the next meal would come from. The food packages not only nourished her family but also provided a sense of stability in their lives.

As months passed by, the HADIA Foundation's support continued to empower Nasima. Her eldest daughter Meena, inspired by her mother’s resilience, started helping her with cleaning jobs, bringing in extra income.

The emergency food packages were more than just food; they represented hope and freedom, particularly for Nasima’s eldest daughter Meena. Nasima’s story is a testament to the difference that a helping hand can make. Today, they stand stronger, not just surviving but being free and hopeful for future as at the worst time of their life HADIA Foundation’s food packages assisted in a small way to keep them going in the face of adversities.

Multivitamins – preventing malnutrition in children and women

According to the United Nations and estimated 23.7 million people in Afghanistan require humanitarian assistance to survive in 2024 (OCHA 2024).

Women and children in Afghanistan, particularly in impoverished rural communities, often suffer from vitamin deficiencies due to limited access to fresh fruits, vegetables, and other essential food groups. This deficiency can lead to a range of health issues, including anemia, weakened immune systems, and stunted growth in children. Providing multivitamins ensures that these groups receive vital nutrients necessary for their physical and cognitive development.

The partnership between Vitamin Angels, and the HADIA Foundation has proven essential in delivering multivitamins to those in need.



This collaboration addresses a pressing health crisis by distributing multivitamin supplements to women and children in hard-to-reach regions. Since inception of this partnership 5 years ago, a total of 38,170 women and children have received multivitamins. The efforts made by both of our organisations help mitigate the effects of malnutrition, reduce the prevalence of disease, and improve the overall health outcomes of families.

In a country where economic instability and food insecurity are prevalent, multivitamins can significantly enhance the quality of life. They empower women and children by improving their health, enabling them to engage more fully in their communities, and increasing their productivity and resilience.

Through strategic partnerships like that of Vitamin Angels and HADIA Foundation, the health and future of Afghanistan's women and children can be safeguarded, fostering a stronger, healthier population capable of overcoming adversity.





Assisting Afghan refugees deported from Pakistan

In the second half of 2023, the Pakistani government made the decision to deport millions of Afghan refugees living in Pakistan for decades. An initial 541,000 were hurriedly deported who passed through Torkham crossing arriving in Afghanistan with nowhere to go as their villages and houses have been destroyed in the past 40 years of conflict.

With no other option, they had to unload their belongings in the open area near Torkham crossing immediately turning the area into a large refugee and returnees camp. International aid organisations rushed to provide tents and emergency assistance. However, the new camp lacked toilets.

HADIA Foundation constructed six toilets—three for women and three for men. This initiative aims to provide dignified access to sanitation facilities. By ensuring that both men and women have dedicated facilities, HADIA Foundation is not only addressing hygiene needs but also promoting privacy and safety for vulnerable populations.

This project reflects the HADIA Foundation's commitment to humanitarian support and the importance of basic needs for displaced individuals. The construction of these toilets is a crucial step towards improving living conditions and restoring dignity for Afghan refugees during a challenging time in their lives.



Getting emergency aid to victims of earthquake in western Herat province of Afghanistan

United Nations reports show, between 7 and 15 October 2003, four powerful (6.3 magnitude) earthquakes struck Herat Province, affecting 1.6 million people and leaving at least 114,000 in urgent need of humanitarian assistance leaving 1,480 people dead and 1,950 wounded (OCHA March 2004). To date, nearly 43,400 people across six districts are reported to be directly affected by the recent earthquakes.

Schools, health facilities, and other infrastructure also impacted by the earthquakes, with 21,300 buildings estimated to have shelters, or in informal settlement sites, leaving them vulnerable to weather, health and other protection hazards.

Responding to the humanitarian disaster, HADIA Foundation assembled a team of volunteer medical doctors and organised a shipment of essential medical supplies accompanying the medical team.

Additionally, emergency food packs were organised for victims of the Zindajan district that was mostly impacted by the earthquakes. As the earthquakes happened right before the start of the harsh winter season, the emergency packs were also filled with blankets and shoes.

As part of its work, HADIA foundation promotes the culture of volunteering amongst Afghans, particularly Afghan medical doctors.

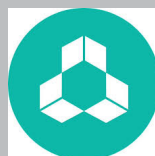
